NOTES

* **EXPLAINATION:** This life list is for birds seen on or from the Inn property beginning November 16, 2006. It only includes birds definitely indentified by clear view and definite field marks by me as I'm a begining birder. It also includes any ID'ed by experts whether I saw or not. I didn't include birds seen very nearby like Belted Kingfisher and Green Heron which frequent the millpond about 50 yards from the Inn land as I hadn't seen them from or on the Inn property Now, they are included as the kingfisher was shopping our stretch of the river and three green herons were hanging out in our little frog pond, probably decreasing frog population. I've included notes where it might be surprising that I saw the bird. I still have no skill at ID'ing birds of prey so have not included much although I've seen many. More as I learn or as knowledgeable birders spot them here.

** **Scientific names** are mostly from <u>Birds of Wisconsin</u>, Stan Tekiela, 2nd ed, 2004, otherwise Peterson's <u>Field Guide to the Birds Eastern Land and Water Birds</u> or from Cornell's ebird website. I have not consistently cross-checked sources.

1 Gold-crowned Kinglet is an unusual bird to see but I'm sure of the identification. On April 7, '07, the poor bird whacked into our glass door during breakfast and I went out to check on it. The bird recovered and flew off after a few minutes but not before I got a clear look at the gold stripe on its head.

2 Red-eyed Vireo was ID'ed by visiting naturalist, Jessica, from nearby Mosquito Hill State Park

3 Redstart - Only seen once but made a clear ID from the yellow patches on females tail. She was teasing an adolescent with food to get it to fly from branch to branch.

4 Barred Owl is common in these parts. Aug 28, 2007, guests saw a barred owl fall off a branch about 9 AM and alterted us. We watched and it was unable to fly much. Steve Hoffman from Hartman Creek SP came and captured the owl easily and took it to The Feather Rescue near New London, WI. It was a yearling, probably male, who was starving but otherwise healthy. She fed it back to a decent weight and we released it at the Inn Sept. 27. Hopefully it is doing fine now.

5 Carolina Wren is not common in Wisconsin which is a ways out of its normal range. The Wisconsin 2007 Christmas Bird Count reported 19 from 13 reporters. This one came to our feeder just a few feet from the house so we got good looks at it and could positively identify it. Many thanks for WSO for their help in narrowing the choices. First spotted Jan, 14, 2009 and again on the 19th. Will try to get a picture. (01/26/09)
